



Did You Know?

The first people to reach the peak of Mt. McKinley was a party led by Episcopal Archdeacon Hudson Stuck in 1913. Stuck led Harry Karstens, Walter Harper and Robert Tatum. Tatum was from Tennessee and the only non-Alaskan in the group. The first woman to reach the peak was Barbara Washburn from Boston, on June 6th, 1947.
